Hardin County Extension Homemakers Annual Report 2020-2021

What a year we have had! The pandemic has changed our way of life, but it has not stopped the commitment Hardin County Homemakers clubs have always had to the community and to the lives of those in need. Following are some of the activities performed in the previous year:

- Over 1,500 masks were made for the children of Hardin County Schools. We received from Hardin County Schools the "Community Partner" Award. Each Homemaker club contributed to making masks.
- Honored our police forces, state and local, with a visit and lunch.
- Two of our members were selected for the Leadership Academy Training.
- Made many donations to food pantries and homeless shelters.
- Stitchers Guild made over 500 surgical gowns and headcovers for medical personnel at Baptist Health Hardin at the start of the pandemic.
- Held a very successful spring bazaar, bringing in visitors from many areas. Because of the successful Bazaar, Hardin County Homemakers were able to provide three \$350 student scholarships and \$250 Homemaker scholarships.
- Cecilia Homemakers went to the Veterans Nursing Home to play Bingo with them and served pies.
- Worked as assistants at the Hardin County Fair and the Family and Life Exhibit.
- Stitchers held a quilt Show and Competition in the Community Center
- Homemakers provided funds to local schools whose students were in arrears in lunch program.
- Stitchers Quilt Club hosted a Hosparus Quilt Community Service Day. This day was dedicated to make lap quilts for Hosparus patients. More than 30 Homemakers and community members attended to make lap quilts. Stitchers also collected quilts during each monthly meeting (for example, in September they collected 10 15 quilts).
- Cecilia Club continued their HUGS Projects even during the Pandemic.
- White Mills Homemaker Club raised money to give additional scholarships to local students. The club also participated in sewing masks.
- More than \$500 was made at the Area Annual Meeting hosted by Hardin County Homemakers for Feeding America Kentucky's Heartland.
- West Point had 3 "angels" who finished several hundred masks for use by Hardin County Schools (Sissy Masterson, Sherry McChesney, Edith Bryant). West Point lost Doris Culver in April. Ms. Culver was 102 years old and attended meetings until COVID. West Point served the Culver family at the memorial and Patsy Duke's family after their loss.
