
Boost Your Ego!

Cultural Arts & Heritage

• More than \$48,000 in funding to support Extension and community projects was generated through the sales of craft items.

Environment, Housing & Energy

 Clubs and county organizations provided monetary and in-kind donations totaling more than \$12,700 for community beautification projects.





Family & Individual Development

 More than 200 clubs taught at least one lesson on healthy eating habits.

4-H Youth Development

• KEHA members contributed more than \$21,000 for 4-H camp scholarships.





Food, Nutrition & Health

 More than \$46,500 was raised and donated to the UK Ovarian Cancer Screening and Research Program.

International

 Collected \$7,363 in Coins for Change, \$3,681 of which supported the Associated Country Women of the World's Pennies for Friendship Program.

• \$56,000 in scholarships for higher education were awarded through KEHA clubs, counties and areas.
