Annual President's Report
July 2017-June 2018

After a restful summer, the Pike County Homemakers met at the Pike County Extension Office on Friday, August 18th to make plans for the 2017-2018 year. With 29 members present, plans were made to continue with the following service projects: holding turban workshops, collecting pop tabs for the Ronald McDonald House, and donating items to the Veteran's Transitional Home in Pikeville. Ways to promote Extension Homemakers were discussed and plans were made to hold our annual "Homemaking in the Mountains". Officer training was held after the meeting and everyone left with handbooks and materials to take back to their individual clubs.

The Pike County Extension Homemakers with the cooperation of the Pikeville Farmer's Market set up a table at the Farmer's Market on Saturday, September 23 for the purpose of marketing our organization and hopefully increase our membership. A brochure was developed by the office staff that outlined our educational lesson topics, special interest and volunteer opportunities and gave information about each of the clubs with their meeting time and location. Members from each of the clubs were there to help disseminate the brochures as well as visitor cards that were used to gather contact information. Many visitors stopped by our table and showed an interest in joining homemakers. We are still hoping that our work will pay off with an increase in membership.

During the week of October 8-16, the Pike County Extension Homemakers celebrated KEHA week with our Pike County Judge-Executive William Deskens signing a proclamation. Extension Homemaker volunteers have reached 685,330 people through the UK Cooperative Extension programming and service in our communities.

Our tradition of hosting "Homemaking in the Mountains" at the Rhododendron Conference Center at the Breaks Interstate Park continued with the date set for Saturday, October 21, 2017. "Homemaking in the Mountains" is a way of celebrating the skills and talents of our homemakers. Many homemakers as well as park visitors were in attendance. Visitors were treated to homemade goodies and were able to view the beautiful displays of quilts, jewelry, crochet items, purses, etc. Many

watched the demonstrations and took part in making a mini-craft. Some new demonstrations added this year were stained glass demonstrated by Bill Heise, making apple butter by David Walker, and arm knitting by Pam Smith.

A Holiday Sewing Class was offered to the community as well as the homemakers on December 8. Participants made a holiday table runner using an assortment of Christmas fabrics.

Turban workshops were held throughout the year. Volunteers have been making turbans and sleep caps for cancer patients for almost 20 years. Donated fabric is used and there is no cost to the patients. Meeting a need is what volunteering is all about. A BIG thank you to all that help!

The Pike County Homemaker Council Meeting and International Day was held on Friday, February 23. Our special speaker was Leslie Workman, FCS agent at the Pike County Extension Office. Leslie visited Ireland in 2017 as part of a FCS Study tour and shared her experiences as well as the similarities Ireland has with Pike County. During this meeting, plans were made for our County Annual Meeting scheduled for June 1st and for the KEHA State Meeting held in May.

Four of the Pike County Homemakers along with Leslie, FCS Agent and Becky Boyer, FCS program assistant attended the KEHA meeting in May at the Crown Plaza in Louisville, Kentucky. Cathy Harville and Gina Duncan went as delegates. Also attending were Joetta Maynard and Debbie Rolen. All those attending pitched in to help with the duties of hosting and taught five of the hands-on crafts. Pike County came away with several cultural art blue ribbons and was recognized for having 10,500 KEHA volunteer hours.

The County Annual Meeting was held June 1st at the Pike County Extension Office. Thanks to Darlene Ball and the Belfry Club for decorating the room in the "Nautical" theme. I hear it was beautiful! Lawrence County Extension Homemakers

The Lawrence County Extension Homemakers have had a really great year. We started the year with our annual Opening Day and officer/Leadership Training Day. Throughout the year we have continued to have monthly club meetings as well as our monthly cultural arts craft day meetings.

This year we gave out over \$700 in scholarship money which we raised through a variety of fundraisers throughout the year. Money for the scholarships was raised through an online auction, a painting class, an auction at County Cultural Arts Day, and through club/individual donations.

In addition to our scholarship donations we have donated our time to the Lawrence County community by several activities and program this year. A few highlights of our service include Quilts for Hospice, where we made and donated several quilts to be given to hospice families; as well as, Bears for Sick Children, where we worked with Louisa Rotary to make vest for bears that are provided to children who are hospitalized in the area.
