### **UK Corner**

The University of Kentucky Family and Consumer Sciences Extension program continues to work to build strong families across the Commonwealth. The support KEHA provides at the local and state level is instrumental in allowing us to work toward this goal. At the state level, we have been actively working to offer training opportunities for both new and tenured agents to ensure our programmatic offerings continue to meet local community needs. I hope you have noticed the range of programming offered in your county newsletters. We are currently gearing up for our February FCS Agent Training Week and are excited about the new programming agents will be to offer at the county level.

FCS Extension continues to be very successful in securing extramural funding. Total grant awards exceeded \$13 million. Extramural funds allow the opportunity to serve specific needs within our communities; programmatic efforts include substance use prevention and recovery, mental health first aid, military families, and nutrition education.

Highlights from extramural projects include over 1,800 individuals trained in Mental Health First Aid, 1,000 community professionals trained in Addiction 101, nearly 1,200 nurses participating in a continuing education course focused on rural mental health challenges and unique farm stressors that impact the well-being of farmers, farmworkers, and their families; and 590,212 SNAP and EFNEP participants were reached.

The Family and Consumers Sciences Extension program has focused heavily on expanding campus-based partners, allowing more program offerings at the county level. Examples of campus-based partners directly contributing to Extension programming include the College of Pharmacy, the College of Dentistry, the Markey Cancer Center, and the College of Nursing.

We are pleased that we can continue to fill positions at the county level; if you know someone interested in joining our fantastic team of Family and Consumer Sciences professionals, please encourage them to check out the Martin-Gatton College of Agriculture, Food and Environment Job website at https://jobs.ca.uky.edu/.
