2021-2022 PURCHASE AREA REPORT

Greetings from Purchase Area! We are comprised of 8 counties. These include: Ballard, Calloway, Carlisle, Fulton, Graves, Hickman, Marshall, and McCracken Counties.

Ballard: Ballard County has four active clubs and they have an annual day. They had an annual night with 32 members attended. They had two members attending KEHA State Meeting. They have made contributions to local agencies, Including Family Focus, Food Pantry, 4H projects (including camp), cOntributions for expenses for student going to national shooting competition. They held yard sales and a Christmas bazaar, conducted monthly craft night, held county-wide craft night with several crafts taught. They participated in Ballard County outreach, Ballard County Chamber of Commerce, Ballard Blood Drives, County Fair Exhibits, and concessions.

Calloway: Calloway County has 4 active clubs with two members attending Annual Day. Three members attended the KEHA State Meeting, and were 100% in contributing to Ovarian Cancer. A yard sale was held in April, which raised over \$700, allowing them to donate funds to purchase camp T-shirts. Forty-six items were entered in the Calloway County Fair by 9 participants. They did not have exhibits in 2020 or 2021.

Carlisle: Carlisle County has five active clubs. They had an annual night, with 45 in attendance. They had 5 members attending both the Area Annual Day and the KEHA State meeting. They had 100% participation in Ovarian Cancer Contributions. They won First Place in the KEHA Promoting a Healthy Kentucky Contest. They participated in their annual Arbor Day Celebration and Tree Planting, by planting a KY Redbud. Twenty were in attendance, and it was streamed on Facebook Live. They also sponsored American Cancer Society's Relay for Life. They continued their efforts to mitigate food insecurity in Carlisle County through community Pantry Box funding.

Fulton: Fulton County has two active clubs. They hosted the August 1 Annual Day with seventeen members attending. Six of their members attended Area Annual Day, and two attended KEHA State Meeting. They were 100% in contributing to Ovarian Cancer. They made donations to tornado victims (food and clothing,) as well as cleaning up the community. They also donated to Christmas funds to both Fulton and Fulton County Schools. They treated Fulton County Library, Hickman City Hall, Circuit Clerk , Court House, Armory Building, all offices and Judge Executive Jim Martin with baked goods and fruit.

Graves: Graves County has 3 active clubs. They have an annual day each year. This year 12 members attended. We sponsored the "How to avoid Scams" meeting where we invited all of the Purchase Area Homemakers along with the community. Lori Farris, from the governor's office, gave a program highlighting scams and how to avoid them. We sponsored three workshops on making bunnies. Homemakers and the community were invited and there were about fifty people who attended the three workshops. It was a "hopping" good time of sewing, stuffing, and showing off the bunnies the participants made. GCEH purchased 60 first kits to distribute to those who had been affected by the

December 10 tornado. The county received the KEHA \$300 project grant to provide a meal to those moving into the Bread of Life and Homes and Hope for Kentucky houses provided and built after the December 10 tornado. So far, over 20 meals have been distributed.

Hickman: Hickman County has three clubs. They do not have an annual day or night. No one attended the Area Annual Day. One person attended KEHA State meeting. They were 100% in donating to the Ovarian Cancer Fund.

Marshall: Marshall County has 5 active clubs. They had a county annual day with 35 members attending. The theme was "A Trip Down Memory Lane" with clubs decorating their tables with a memory theme; sewing, baking/cooking items, a tea party collection, and silent auctions. Two members attended the KEHA State Meeting. They were 100% in contributing to Ovarian Cancer. Two of their clubs contribute to community and military. Some ways include donating snack bags for schools, blessing boxes, cards for Marcella's Kitchen, bags for schools, blessings boxes, and cards for Marcella's Kitchen, change décor in dining room, military cards, smellies, and cool ties. At the County Annual Day there were 35 attending. Theme was "Trip Down Memory Lane" with a memory theme of sewing, baking/cooking, and tea party collections.

McCracken: McCracken County has 7 active clubs. They have an Annual Night. This year 43 attended this. Two members attended the Area Annual Day. Five members attended the KEHA State Meeting. County was 100% in contributing to Ovarian Cancer. We participated in an Extension Service Open House promoting homemakers and our specialty clubs. We held our annual Holiday Bazaar and Vendor Fair with 30 vendors and 5 homemaker clubs represented. The clubs assisted with the 4H Tornado relief backpack program which provided 701 backpacks. They hosted the Culinary, Cultural Arts, and Textile exhibits at the McCracken County fair with 34 exhibitors and 336 exhibits. A new scrapbooking club was started and has approximately 15 participants each month.

Pennyrile Area Report- July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022

<u>Caldwell County</u> Homemakers participated in a variety of community service activities and volunteered their time to extension, the community, KEHA and their extended families. The clubs donated to the Ovarian Cancer fund, donated to the HOPE and Cope family resource centers, donated to project graduation, donated to the Feeding God's Children backpack program, and worked with 4-H youth. In January 2022, the Caldwell County Homemakers hosted the Souper Bowl of Caring and collected over 300 non-perishable food items for a local food pantry.

<u>Christian County</u> Extension Homemakers had a successful year. We learned, laughed and made a difference in our community while finally getting to meet in person again. YAY!!! We contributed to local organizations including: Pennyrile Children's Advocacy Center, Rock Steady Boxing, Highland Volunteer Fire Department, Dyslexia Association of the Pennyrile, and Imagination Library through the Mini-Grant program. Members also contributed to the Rotary Action through the donation of baked goods for auction as well as the Sweets Shoppe. We awarded a college scholarship to Sarah Sargeant. Finally, we wrapped up out year with an intriguing and educational Annual Meeting "Batter Up". Our speaker shared how Christian County, KY came to be known as the "Batter Capitol of the World". It was a wonderful end to a great year.

<u>Crittenden County</u> Homemakers have ha a busy program year. In July 2021 we had a summer outing to the Pour Room Candle Bar in Paducah. Members participated in the bib blue book club and a barn quilt painting class. In August FCS exhibits returned to the county fair. Various activities included helping with the County Fair Breakfast, officer training clinic, and held the 72nd annual homemakers meeting. In September, clubs began meeting again. October celebrated homemakers' week, had a 50's theme membership drive, bread and candy sales fundraiser and a twilight fitness event. Two Swedish weaving classes were held in November. In December Christmas parties were held and trees were decorated throughout the community. Quilt club and hooks and needles clubs were reorganized after 2 years of covid break. In March various classes and activities were related to cultural arts activities. A bread series class was held. Continued breads classes, muffins and yeast rolls, and a backroads quilt show was held. May had 6 members attend the KEHA meeting, volunteered for reality store and the Challengers club had their annual tea party. In June, there was a summer door hanging class, and a pin weaving workshop was held.

<u>Livingston County</u> Has two strong special interest homemaker groups; the Block of the Month quilting group and the Pins and Needles sewing group. Members meet monthly for both groups and do many classes, special projects as well as community service projects. Recently, a Pinterest Club has been started and has had a lot of interest. We have gained several new homemakers due to this club starting.

Lyon County's 2021-2022 year has turned out to be less challenging than last year but still not quite back to normal or what we perceive to be normal. We have 5 active clubs and quite a few Membersat-large. Zoom classes still are very popular and actually quite convenient for our members. Our FCS Agent Angie York presented classes weekly with some in the morning, some in afternoon and some evening. They included cooking, sewing and quilting. Six of our members won blue ribbons at the state cultural arts. One of our clubs mad Tie Blankets for a county organization, collected items monthly for the Sheriff's Boys and Girls Ranch in out area. One homemaker went to the Ranch weekly and taught the campers the proper care of horses. Other clubs were able to make financial donations to the Ranch, Project Prom and 4-H. The Homemaker year 2021-2022 has ended but the homemakers have not stopped participating in community volunteer opportunities, such as the Food Bank, Nonnie's Attic and various other church and community activities. We're looking forward to the 2022-2023 Homemaker Year. Our Zoom Class opportunities are continuing throughout the summer and we are having a county gathering in August. We all enjoy being a part of the Homemaker Organization and really even though there is an official year end, we really don't stop and that's a good thing.

Muhlenberg County Homemakers had a very busy and successful year of activities. Many activities were rescheduled that had been cancelled due to COVID. October 10-16 was declared homemaker week by Executive order of the County Judge Curtis McGhee. Several participated in October Walk-athon. Drive through Bean Supper was a successful fund raiser for Ovarian Cancer. Quilt raffle tickets were also a successful means of raising funds and promoting homemakers in the community. KEHA awards included donating over 1,000 dollars to Ovarian Cancer Research. Muhlenberg also won the passport award. Muhlenberg County homemakers worked diligently in the county when tornados hit in December. Homemakers made financial donations, fed workers, and volunteered in a variety of ways and continue to do so. Christmas presents were delivered to Sparks Assisted Living. Crafts and Bingo is also done at this facility. Book club has 6 members that read 6 books each from the KEHA book list. There is also a travel group in Muhlenberg County that took several trips this past year. A collection of long pants and underwear were donated to 2 local elementary schools. Gloves, toboggans and scarves were also donated to 2 elementary schools. Master Clothing Volunteer, worked with 4-H students. The ones who completed the class made a blouse and hair piece. Plastic project was proposed that each club develop their own recycling plan. Identity theft class is to be held in June. Coins for Change is to be donated to the project to purchase 2 buffalos for women in Philippines. Donations were made to the 4-H Penguin Plunge to support the back pack program. A \$500 scholarship was given to a local high school graduate. Western State Hospital was supported at Christmas.

Todd County homemakers continued to meet and be actively involved in their communities. Members participated in monthly lessons and special interest classes taught in-person and on Zoom. Donna Settle continued to serve as President, Dianne Higgins served as Treasurer and Barbara McIntyre served as Family and Individual Development for Pennyrile Area Homemakers. Four members attended the KEHA annual meeting in Owensboro. Two homemakers won 8 blue ribbons at the state KEHA Cultural Arts Contest. The council collaborated with the Health Department Hands program to provide diapers, wipes, towels, and other necessities to Hands families. Members donated food and volunteered at food banks, especially during times such as the fall and winter when needs were greater than normal. Members made Care packages to send to soldiers. Multiple individuals and clubs adopted Christmas Angels through Family Resource and Youth Service Centers to help Todd county families during Christmastime. Club members supported the Center for Courageous Kids in Scottsville by collecting money during the month of March and volunteered time and made donations to Grace and Mercy and all members contributed to the UK Ovarian Cancer Research project. Homemakers also served as volunteer leaders for 2 Super Star Chef Cooking Camps, raised money for the Brenda Church Memorial Scholarship fund, and donated funds to send youth to 4-H Camp. Several members participated in a Bingocize research project with Western Kentucky University and UK Cooperative Extension Service.

<u>Trigg County</u> Homemakers had 75 members in 2021-2022. Three clubs met in person and the others received lessons and information through the mail. We participated in the monthly lessons. Our main service project was the collection of Bingo Prizes for the local Senior Center. We also awarded \$500 scholarships to two Trigg County High School seniors. In May, we had a Taco Tuesday gathering to "Taco -bout" homemakers and celebrated making it through another year. Plans are in the works for 2022-2023.

One of our members and her husband were featured in the newspaper for the many hours they volunteer at the River Park Center and the Bluegrass Museum.

Our club attended the funeral of one of our founders and helped prepare food for the funeral meal. We also presented a plaque in her honor as organist/pianist at her church.

Southern Belles Homemakers

For the past two years, the Southern Belles Club has provided Buddy Bag items to the Owensboro Police Department, the Sheriff Department and the Jail Visitation Program.

These bags contain a fleece blanket, medium size stuffed animal, small hand held stuffed animal, story book, coloring book/activity book combination, and set of crayons. This past month Southern Belles members provided enough to fill 15 handmade tote bags with drawstrings that little ones up to 10 years of age could carry on their shoulders.

Children's clothes and belonging are contaminated when exposed to active drug labs so young children are often transported to the local hospital for health and decontamination services in their underwear. Hence, the need for blankets. As these little ones are moved on to foster homes they have some fun items that belong just to them. Children visiting incarcerated parents have something to keep them occupied.

Southern Belles has now begun a Veterans Project. Members are providing toiletries for homeless veterans in need of immediate clothing and toiletries. Items included in the kits are small sized shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, toothpaste, white socks, flannel pajama bottoms and sweatshirts.

Southern Belles is now beginning the 47 years as a club of Daviess County Extension Homemakers Club

Trinity Homemakers

The Trinity Homemakers Club is the newest traditional club in Daviess County. It was formed in 2018. It is a very active club with great members who are willing to undertake any project. Below are projects that were completed in the 2021-2022 year.

Members provided a full course meal to St. Benedict's Homeless Shelter.

Members provided breakfast items to St. Benedict's Homeless Shelter.

Members prepared and served a full course meal at Breckenridge United Methodist Community Meal. This is a meal served every Sunday afternoon to those experiencing food insecurity.

Members gave toys worth approximately \$120 to Toys for Tots.

Members provided several large boxes of hygiene and beauty items to the residents at the Mary Kendall Home for Children.

Members supported Ovarian Cancer Research.

Daviess County Homemakers is made up of seven clubs. Of those six are traditional which are Homespun, Maceo, South Hampton, Southern Belle and Trinity. One, Happy Hour, is a specialty club. One of the traditional clubs was mailbox members during the 2021-2022 year due to the members' ages and the pandemic. The specialty club does craft projects.

Below is the information that has been submitted at this time. Four clubs have submitted information. One club will discuss what they would like to submit at their meeting next week.

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Maceo Club

This club maintains the "Welcome to Maceo" community garden. They contribute \$50.00 each year to the Daviess County Homemakers Scholarship fund. Donations of paper products is made to Puzzle Pieces, Jars of peanut butter are donated to the Bowlware Center and clothes are donated to the Dugan Best Baptist Church.

South Hampton Club

South Hampton club supports the Daviess County Homemakers scholarship fund and ovarian cancer fund.

Members support recycling by collecting soda tabs.

One member cut out the pillowcases for Camp Courageous and several members helped sew the pillowcases. Five of our members delivered over 300 pillowcases and some aprons made during the 2021-2022 year to Camp Courageous in June, 2022. They were given a great tour of the facility, too.

Several members attend the Brown Book Club each month.

Members decorate the extension office foyer two months of each year.

Monthly meetings are held in the lovely homes of members where a delicious dessert is enjoyed. In November 2021, one of our members invited us for a lovely formal fall lunch.

In December, the club's Christmas Mix and Mingle was held at which finger foods brought by members were enjoyed. Each member brought a food item for our club Christmas Exchange. Members also made a donation to the Goodfellows Club.

This was organized by Lelia Gaines who is a member of the South Hampton club and was serving as the county and area international chair at the time.

A 2021-2022 Daviess County Homemakers scholarship was presented to Cade Crume in June, 2021.

The Green River Area International Program project was displayed at the KEHA Annual Meeting in Bowling Green, Kentucky on June 22 and 23, 2021. The project was a planter made from EcoBricks. This project was led by Lelia Gaines from the Daviess County South Hampton Club and won the KEHA International Award.

Jean Chapman from the Habit Homemakers Club taught an embroidery class in July 2021.

Homemakers traveled to the Center for Courageous Kids in Scottsville, Kentucky on July 29, 2021 to deliver pillowcases that have been made by Daviess County Homemakers. Over 1200 pillowcases were made and given. Pillowcases were also provided to the Mary Kendall Home, Sunrise Foster Care, Oasis, Sleep in Heavenly Peace, Graced Again, Crossroads, Borrowed Hearts and families impacted by the tornados in Western Kentucky. Another 300 pillowcases were made in 2021-2022 and delivered in June 2022.

The Daviess County Annual Meeting was not held in 2021 due to the pandemic, but office were installed on October 12, 2021

Our clubs continues to decorate the foyer at the extension office on a monthly basis.

The 2021-2022 year was ended with an ice cream social during the Daviess County Extension Homemakers Annual Meeting on June 10, 2022.

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In March we started planning for the McLean County Ag Fair scheduled for July 7-9, 2022. Connie Clary a McLean County Homemaker member, presented an environmental project "Native Trees" to the Council to be considered as an upcoming project for our homemakers at Myer Creek Park. She is discussing with various agencies for their input and will bring the project back for us to approach.

In April we had two high school individuals apply for the McLean County Homemakers Scholarships. Upon graduation in May we gave away two scholarships at \$500 each. On April 14, 2022 we held our Annual meeting at the 4-H activities building. It was our "Roaring Twenties" and many who attended wore the 1920's atture. There were 27 in attendance. Member Sue berry presented the program on the "Roaring Twenties" in McLean County and the surrounding area. The Silent Auction raised \$252.00 to be put toward the McLean County 4-H camp Scholarship Fund.

In May the 88th Annual KEHA Meeting was held in Owensboro at the Convention Center, May 10-12, 2022. Several of our members attended and helped with putting it together by helping make the covered bridges for the center pieces. Sue Berry held classes in which members helped her on her craft projects in the classes. We also had two delegates representing McLean County.

We also had members attending the Master Clothing Program. Also, 1 member attending the Leadership Training.

In June members helped with the two day 4-H camp at Myers Creek Park. There were nine kids in attendance and got their projects done for the fair.

An amount of \$3,067.50 was earned for our efforts. We also participated in the Reduce Hunger Community Service Challenge and donated money on items to Food Pantries around the area.

In April, for our first event in our new addition, we held an International Luncheon with two guests from Ukraine, my daughter-in-law who has been here for 17 years, and her childhood friend who had just escaped from the bombing of Kiev. - Club adopted a road in their county to pick up trash on.

- Most counties had various projects to raise money for their scholarships (quilting class, Craft Bazaars, selling pecans and almonds, etc)
- Raffle basket to support cancer victims.
- Holiday Fun Day where Homemakers prepared a healthy lunch and taught craft classes free to the public.

- Collect and give stuffed animals to the local police to give to children that are taken to a foster home.

QUICKSAND AREA ANNUAL REPORT November 2022

Greetings from the Quicksand Area. Our area is made up of eight (8) counties – Breathitt, Knott, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Owsley, Perry and Wolfe. Six of the eight counties have an FCS agent. We welcomed 2 new agents - in Knott County, Lorie Adams and in Perry County, Kelsey Sebastian. The Owsley County FCS agent position is vacant. The Breathitt County FCS agent position will be vacant January 1, 2023 as Kayla Watts, Breathitt Co. FCS agent, accepted a 3 year Special Assignment for Resiliency and Recovery working with the 4 counties most impacted by the flooding – Breathitt, Knott, Letcher and Perry.

We resumed our in-person annual area meeting on October 27, 2022 in Hyden, Leslie County. There were 46 homemakers, 6 FCS agents and 6 visitors, total attendance of 58. New officers were installed: Pam Campbell, Quicksand Area President; Matilda Parks, Vice President; Henrietta Sheffel, Secretary; Cathy Hayes, Treasurer.

In 2020 - 2021, each county submitted their own program of work reports. This seemed to work better for the individual counties as they took responsibility for keeping track of events and number of attendees.

Four of the Quicksand Area counties – Breathitt, Knott, Letcher and Perry - were severely impacted by the July 2022 flooding in eastern Kentucky. The FCS agents in these counties were boots on the ground distributing donated food, water and supplies to the many families that had damage to their homes, outbuildings, gardens, driveways and property.

The FCS agents in the Quicksand Area have been busy planning and delivering information about programs and lessons that benefit their homemakers and communities. The homemakers have enjoyed learning new skills through the various Programs of Work lessons they received in the mail and/or through the Grab N Go bags but are happy to be returning to in person programs. Area homemakers continue to work hard to stay healthy and safe at home. They continue to learn new skills, meet new challenges and recruit new members to benefit their communities and counties.
